Town of Ossipee – Annual Town Meeting

Abridged Minutes

March 10, 2010

Moderator Katy Meserve opened the Town Meeting at 6:30 pm; she then proceeded with the Pledge of Allegiance. Moderator Meserve then introduced Rev. Waugh, who did the invocation. Moderator Meserve thanked all the staff for setting up for the Elections of the Town Officers held yesterday, March 9, 2010 and for the set-up for the Town Meeting tonight.

Moderator Meserve then announced that the newly elected officers will be sworn in on Monday, March 15, at 5:30 pm at the Town Hall.

Moderator Meserve then explained that everyone should have received a voting packet, with a sheet of guidelines, a voting card, ballot slip and a Town Report. It was also announced that if you do not have a voting card you cannot vote or address this body. Should you find any corrections or omissions please let Kellie Skehan know. Anyone who is not a registered voter in town will not be able to speak or vote on any motion. If such a person is attending they may appeal to the Moderator, who will ask if anyone objects, upon hearing no objections the body will be polled.

Moderator Meserve then asked if there was anyone in attendance that would like to speak. Jen Berkowitz asked to speak on the School's Out Program in Article #5. There were no objections to Jen speaking on this article. Andy Johnson asked to speak for Life Bridge - Mentoring also in Article #5. There were no objections for Andy to speak on this article.

Moderator Meserve made the introductions: Kellie Skehan – Town Clerk/Tax Collector, Harry Merrow – Selectman, Kathleen Maloney – Selectman, E. Morton Leavitt – Selectman, Martha Eldridge – Town Administrator, Brad Harriman – Public Works Director and Town Council - Jennifer Haskill. Moderator Meserve turned the mic over to Donna Sargent, who then introduced the Budget Committee: Robert Morin, Jane ter Kuile, Roland Millette – WO Precinct; Jean Simpson – CO Precinct. Moderator Meserve then introduced Dave Senecal, the Zoning Enforcement Officer.

Moderator Meserve made the announcement that you need to go to a mic and announce your full name, if you wish to speak on an article. You do not have to use the mic if you wish to make a motion or second a motion. As far as amendments go, we will deal with article #5 which is a little unique because of each line item. We will deal with each line item as we go along and each line item may have an amendment. There are no amendments to amendments, and there will be no amendments to an article that would change the meaning of the warrant articles

intent. A motion to restrict reconsideration on any article will only be accepted after the vote and anytime thereafter during the meeting. A motion that is non-debatable, like to call the question or to lay a motion aside, will require a 2/3 majority vote. We will not debate this; we will only vote and will need 2/3 majority vote. No motion to pass over an article will be accepted, but a motion to postpone indefinitely is acceptable and will need to be discussed and a majority vote will be needed. There will be no voice votes unless ordered by the Moderator prior to the vote. If there is any article that needs to be voted on by secret ballot, which we have at least one, the Moderator will explain this procedure at that time. If the Moderator wishes to vote she will and it does not require a tie for her to vote. There were no questions on procedures.

OSSIPEE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

Annual Report 2010

The Ossipee Economic Development Committee is scheduled to meet on the fourth Tuesday of every other month. Meetings are called as needed. New members are always welcome. Our Mission is to foster organized growth utilizing human and natural resources in a responsible way. The OEDC seeks to educate and involve the community in its work with a very limited budget.

The OEDC has focused on two projects this past year. The Economic Fair in March with the Ossipee Main Street Program was a great success. Many of the presenters returned for their fifth year. A workshop session on web sites for businesses was well received. Visitors were treated to refreshments donated by Hannaford and a scavenger hunt with prizes for those who visited the most presenters. SCORE and Micro-Credit representatives were available, as well as WEDCO, MWVEC, banks and realtors among the thirty or so tables around the gym. Plans for the Sixth Annual Economic Fair on March 26 from 9-12 are underway. The theme this year is Learning/Educating Ourselves about how we can improve our economic situation.

Members of the Ossipee Economic Development Committee with the Ossipee Main Street Economic Development Committee worked together on the concept of business revitalization with historic preservation while building a feeling of community, the goal of the Ossipee Main Street Program. Many community leaders and business people joined in welcoming and supporting two new businesses.

The OEDC members are involved in projects in the Mount Washington Valley Economic Council. OEDC member Donna Sargent is Ossipee's representative on the Council. She is a member of the Revolving Loan Fund Committee. We encourage residents of Ossipee who would like to start or expand a business to apply for a loan. SCORE volunteers are available to help with business plans. The Technology Village is also home to the Granite State College and the NH Technical School offering courses to help career advancement. Business tax credits are available for any business to buy that would benefit from the tax credits.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT FOR 2010

The year 2010 was busy and a number of changes/improvements were made throughout the town. These are listed below:

We received approval from the state to begin work at the freight building we purchased a couple of years ago and to also proceed with the sidewalks previously approved at Town Meeting.

Energy conservation goals are continually being met at your town hall. This year the building has been completely insulated and re-shingled. The cupola has had extensive repair work done. We were very pleased to be able to replace the broken weathervane with the one shown on the front cover.

The five (5) year revaluation of the town has been completed and we will be starting up the next revaluation per State requirements.

The Town completed a new "Emergency Operations Plan".

The Public Works Department continues to be busy. In addition to the normal maintenance of town roads, 4.5 miles of road was paved this year. Work at the transfer station has resulted in many improvements.

Perambulation of the Ossipee and Tuftonboro town lines has been completed to the satisfaction of both towns. The re-mapping of the town has been completed.

We continue to battle milfoil on Ossipee Lake. DASH was performed on two (2) sections of the Lake. This will apparently be a continuing problem for which we will need to appropriate money for the treatment.

We would like to thank all Boards, Department heads, Commissions, and employees for exercising fiscal conservatism in managing their budgets this year as well as the coming year.

2010 OSSIPEE MAIN STREET ANNUAL REPORT

2010 was a busy year filled with many accomplishments. These were made possible through the collaborative efforts of Ossipee Main Street volunteers and donors. Volunteers worked on a wide variety of committees, projects, special events and partnership projects and donated more than 1,800 hours of their time to Main Street this year. Private and public property owners reinvested more than \$60,000 worth of improvement projects within the designated target area.

Major projects included the 2nd year of Ossipee Farmers Market. We organized and were involved in The Ossipee Economic Expo, the Annual Joe Skehan Youth Fishing Derby, the Beech River Run, the \$25,000 Rubber Duck Race, the Picnic on the Park introduction of attractive new signage through the efforts of the Wayfinding Project, and special events to raise awareness of and funds for Main Street efforts.

Ossipee Main Street partnered with the Town and many local non-profits throughout the year: the Highway Safety Committee, the Capital Improvement Committee, the Chamber of Commerce, the Carroll County Transportation Project, Ossipee Concerned Citizens, Historical Society, Old Home Week Committee, Economic Development Committee, Mount Washington Valley Economic Council, & Lakes Region Planning Commission.

In February, the youth fishing derby continued its great tradition of winter outdoor fun for area children with a dramatic increase in participation. In March, the Economic Fair grew to over 120 attendees and returned to Town Hall with more workshops. Over 450 Rubber Ducks swam the Bearcamp River in the \$25,000 Rubber Duck Race in August. The 3rd Annual Beech River Run 5k Road Race and Youth Fun Run, the number grew to over 100 participants compared to 80 in 2009. During the fall, Volunteers from Main Street and the Garden Club prepared holiday sprays to decorate the target area properties. Additionally, the park was decorated with a tree and holiday lights and lights were put up throughout Center Ossipee during the Christmas season.

Throughout this past year, the enthusiasm and support for the efforts of Main Street grew considerably. Every event or project elicited new volunteers who came forward and offered to help with a specific project, or volunteer a special talent or skill. We'd like to take this opportunity to thank them, as well as the Town of Ossipee, and each of our supporters for all our success. Without all of you, our work would not be possible. State of New Hampshire Laws:

Leash Law: All dogs shall be on a leash or within voice control of their owner.

Barking dog /Nuisance calls: Dogs that bark for 30 minutes or more are considered to be a nuisance. Dogs that continue to bark, their owners are subject to fines.

Outside dogs: Outside dogs are required to have at all times no matter the season, access to shelter and water.

Dog Registration: Dogs are required to be registered with your Town Clerk by May 1st of each calendar year. Your dog is required to be current on shots and proof of shots is required at the time of registration. The owners of dogs not registered by May 1st are subject to State and Town fines.

Take advantage of the four local Rabies Clinics in our area to bring your pet up to date on their shots.

On the occasion that your dog is picked up without any identification, they may be taken to the Lakes Region Humane Society for safe keeping. You can pick up your dog after contacting LRHS. They can be reached at 539-1077. The dog officer can be contacted through the Sheriff's Department at 539-2284.

Summer residents: It is a good idea to register your dog here in Ossipee for your summer stay. On many occasions during a holiday weekend or vacation, a four-legged resident will have to spend the weekend at Lakes Region Humane Society because we are unable to reach your home town Vet or Town Office. Other possibilities are a second collar for summer time with your local home phone number and address.

We are providing services from the same location, same friendly faces, updated equipment, ambulances, and more importantly highly trained/licensed individuals taking care of you, your family and friends.

For many years residents had the comfort of not being responsible for ambulance transport expenses. Your Board of Selectmen has accepted our offer to allow us to utilize our "Ambulance Debt Forgiveness Program".

We want everyone to continue calling 911 without the fear of an ambulance bill. The "Ambulance Debt Forgiveness Program" will allow for residents that haven't got insurance to have their debt forgiven.

As always residents that have insurance, the contractor will bill and expect payment from residents that have insurance. This includes insurance deductibles, co-pays and "patient responsibility". Residents that receive payment from their insurance carrier for services rendered by the contracted ambulance service will be held responsible for paying the said contracted ambulance service.

We look forward to serving all individuals that live, visit and drive through the GREAT town of Ossipee.

The following programs were offered to you in 2010, and most will continue through 2011:

Library passes available for check out:

Wright Museum, Wolfeboro, NH, New Hampshire State Parks (available summers only), Remick Country Doctor Museum & Farm, Tamworth, NH, and the Children's Museum of New Hampshire in Dover, NH (available summers only)

New Hampshire Downloadable Audio books and newly added E-books:

These can be accessed from home or the library using your library card number.

Current circulation: Downloadable Audio books, 352; Downloadable E-books, 52

Computers: 12 computers and 4 laptop stations are available for use. Circulation: 4844. We count the checking out of a computer, not the time used. If we counted one-hour usage the figure would be approximately 18,000 times. We let the patrons use the computers as long as they want to unless we have someone waiting.

Britannica Online: Can be accessed from home or at the library. Circulation: 1890

Inter-library-loaning: Borrowing and lending books, books on CD, magazines and movies from other libraries in NH. Statistics: We requested 898 items from other libraries; we received 564 and 334 were unfilled (62% filled). Other libraries requested 1119 items from us, 834 were sent to them; 285 requests were unfilled (74% filled).

Ossipee Public Library Baby Book Bag Program: Funds provided by the Friends of the Ossipee Public Library and through a grant from the Rotary Club of Ossipee. Eleven bags were given to babies residing in Ossipee. Each book bag contains some books and a toy, handmade by volunteers.

Kindergarten Book Bag Program: Given in memory of Cathy Ziegler. Fifty book bags were given to the Ossipee Central School. Each bag contains several books, a kindergarten workbook and information about obtaining a library card.

AARP volunteers provide tax assistance from February 1st, to June 30th.

Book discussion group meets the first Tuesday afternoon of each month at 2:00 pm.

Ossipee Garden Club meets the first Thursday afternoon at 1:00 pm.

Quilters group meets the second and fourth Thursday at 10:00 am.

Knitting and crocheting group meets the second and fourth Wednesday at 1:00 pm. at OCC.

Story-time for pre-school children is held on Tuesday mornings at 10:30 am.

Story-time for babies is held on Friday mornings at 10:30 am.

Summer Reading program with entertainment, crafts, stories, certificates, and prizes. This program runs from late June until mid August.

The Friends of the Ossipee Public Library meet quarterly on the third Tuesday at 1:00 pm.

The Recreation Dept. offers several programs in the meeting room during the year.

Tutoring: Students of all ages receive instruction from their tutors at the library.

This is the planning year for the 10 year transportation plan. Local information from the area regional planning commissions is key to having successful projects included in the proposed plan which is delivered by law to the Governors desk by December 15, 2011 and then by law to the NH House and Senate by January 2012.

I cannot emphasize enough the urging of local citizens to volunteer for the dozens of volunteer boards and commissions which the Governor and Council are required to find individuals to serve on. In May 2010, the Historical Society's programs began with a well-attended Joe Bradley/John Hartog production, "The Ossipee Ring Dike." The video toured spots where evidence of the volcano on which Ossipee is located can still be seen, and the following discussion period was most enlightening. In June, Josh Arnold, founder of the GALA (Global Awareness, Local Action) non-profit described his organization's goals, and his plans for the former Ossipee Mountain Grange building in Water Village. The audience took a short trip down Route 171 to tour the old Grange building, which many had never visited. July's program featured local (retired) firefighter Roland Stockbridge, who gave a fascinating account of the history of the Ossipee fire departments. Mr. Stockbridge had many fascinating artifacts, photos and news stories on display which the audience took time to study and appreciate after the presentation.

August was a busy month! On Friday the 6th, we sponsored a Comedy and Magic Show, featuring professional magician Matt Roberts. His performance was outstanding and much enjoyed by those in attendance. Our thanks to Joan Harrington for arranging Matt's appearance! On the 17th, Dennis Chesley gave a talk about mushrooms. It was amazing to learn about the many varieties of edible mushrooms (and others not so safe!) that can be found in the woods and fields in the Ossipee area. Of course, the exact location of the best specimens is a closely guarded secret. The annual service at the Early Settlers Meeting House (ESMH) was held on Sunday the 22nd.

September brought a very special program about the Honor Flight New England. The program's leader, Joe Byron, told about the planning and preparation that goes into each excursion, which takes veterans to Washington, DC to visit the World War memorials. Many moving stories were shared by audience members, and we were all left with a great appreciation for the volunteers who make the Freedom Flight possible.

We are so grateful for our hard-working volunteers. This summer, Ann Martin-Segrini was instrumental in making sure we were represented at the weekly Sunday morning Farmer's Market and her sales considerably helped our financial situation. Our building stewards (David Hodsdon for Grant's Store, John Hartog for the ESMH, and Jim and Cindy Spencer for the 1916 Court House) are invaluable in keeping an eye on these buildings and reporting problems before they become unmanageable. Work has begun on restoring the windows at Grant's Store, and a coat of paint is

planned for both the Store and the Meeting House.

Of course, fund-raising is always a big part of our mission as the guardians of Ossipee's past. OSSIPEE PLANNING BOARD

2010 Annual Report

The Ossipee Planning Board meets on the first and third Tuesdays of each month at 7 PM at the Ossipee Town Hall. Additional work sessions are held on the fourth Tuesday of the month as needed to work on changes to the Ossipee Zoning Ordinance and other Planning Board business. Bill Grover is Chairman, Roger ter Kuile Vice Chairman, and other members are Roy Barron, Brett Cushing, Conduct Billings, Ski Kwiatkowski. Carol Gartland is the Selectmen's Representative, and Bob Gillette is an Alternate. David Senecal, Zoning Enforcement Officer, attends the meetings as needed.

In 2010 the Planning Board approved 2 Subdivisions; one is a change of ownership to a 59 unit condominium of a camping area and the other is a conditional approval of an 8 lot Subdivision, 2 Site Plan Reviews, 9 Mergers of Lots, 7 Boundary Line Adjustments, and 1 Special Use Permit. 4 Excavation Permits were granted for six years and another gravel pit is in the process of reclamation.

The Ossipee Planning Board recommends that applicants meet with Dave Senecal, our Zoning Enforcement Officer, before applying to the Planning Board to help ensure compliance with all zoning issues. The Planning Board encourages a pre-application discussion with the board that can be scheduled for any Planning Board meeting by calling the secretary. Many more applicants are taking advantage of this opportunity to better prepare their applications. Each Site Plan Review Application includes a checklist for Minor or Major applications determined by the applicant based on the size of the project. If the checklist is incomplete, the application is not acceptable. All of these applications are available on line or at the Selectmen's Office.

We encourage interested people to attend our meetings, as input from the townspeople helps determine the focus of the Planning Board. Being an alternate is a good way to learn about the work of the Planning Board in your town and make your voice heard in the community.

The Planning Board has spent many hours fine tuning changes in the Chapter XX of the Zoning Ordinance, Water Resource Protection District. The major change from the 1989 Chapter is the inclusion of a much improved map of the Ossipee Aquifer. Proposed drinking water protection has been the focus of meetings with LRPC and GMCG members in the towns of the Ossipee Aquifer for over a year with the result that each of the towns will be voting on their own adaptation of the ordinance so the entire area will be protected.

Extensive amounts of time were also spent revising a draft Sign Ordinance and a Draft Hawkers and Peddlers Ordinance which will be followed up on by the Board of Selectmen.

OSSIPEE ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

ANNUAL REPORT 2010

Members of the Board are Jean Simpson, Chairman; David Babson Vice Chairman; Bruce Parsons, Jon Brown, and Stanley Brothers. Alternates are Lisa Hinckley and Leonard Shurtleff.

Public hearings are held on the second Tuesday of each month at 7:00 p.m. as needed. If necessary a meeting can be held on the fourth Tuesday. The ZBA met on seven of the twelve months this past year.

Seven cases involving Variances were heard and two Requests for Rehearings were received. Five applicants received the Variances requested. One case was denied and one was withdrawn. Four of the Variances granted were for cases where the proposed activity was not allowed in that zone, in our Zoning Ordinance. Two were for structures to be built closer than the required setback. Some involved requests for several Variances to be considered. Another was an after-the-fact Variance for unpermitted building contrary to zoning that resulted in the applicant paying legal fees.

If the applicant is denied a building permit because of the need for a Variance or a Special Exception, Dave Senecal, the Zoning Enforcement Officer, issues a denial and instructs the applicant to apply to the Ossipee Zoning Board. The Zoning Enforcement Officer makes sure that all the conditions placed on a decision by the ZBA are satisfied, before he grants a building permit. The Zoning Board of Adjustment has worked closely with the Zoning Enforcement Officer to ensure that possible violations of the conditions of a decision are reviewed.

Prior to the ZBA hearing the case, a fee must be paid for public notification and certified mailing to all abutters, as well as a hearing fee of \$75.00. The secretary compiles the information with the application and the completed checklist to send it to the Board members before the hearing. Board members often make a visit to the site, so they will have a better understanding of the case. An official procedure is followed for conducting the case. At the conclusion of the case, the ZBA members do a role call vote. The results are publicized in a public notice as to whether the application was granted or denied. Any conditions of approval or reasons for denial are included. The applicant must wait 30 days, so that anyone dissatisfied with the decision has a chance to start the appeal process.

Two ZBA members attended the annual Office of Energy and Planning conference for further training.

Continuing education is done on a regular basis. New Hampshire Building Officials and the Lakes Region Safety Officials meet once a month in Concord and Meredith. Other seminars I attend when available. Staying informed is necessary with the changing industry.

Inspections of buildings are done on a daily basis. Certificate of Occupancy permits are issued when a building is complete.

As Health Officer for the Town, I do inspections of Schools, Day Care Centers and failed septic systems. State Health Officers have an Association with quarterly meetings.

LAKES REGION PLANNING COMMISSION

The Lakes Region continues to grow and evolve. As our economy and world change, so does the work we are engaged in. The Lakes Region Planning Commission (LRPC) is an organization established according to state law to provide area communities and the region with the capacity to respond to and shape the pressures of change in a purposeful way. With a service area covering over 1,200 square miles in Belknap, Carroll, Grafton and Merrimack Counties, the LRPC provides a wide range of planning services to member municipalities. The Commission offers direct and support services including technical assistance, geographic information systems, transportation planning, land use, environmental planning, hazard planning and economic development. Local, state, and federal resources primarily fund the LRPC. We also maintain a regular dialogue with state agencies as a resource for the entire Lakes Region. Our overall goal is to provide support, knowledge, and leadership to the governments, businesses, and citizens of the Lakes Region.

Some of the services provided on behalf of the town of Ossipee and the region in the past fiscal year are noted below:

LOCAL:

- Prepared for and attended the Ossipee Aquifer Steering Committee (OASC) workshop on the development of Natural Resources/Aquifer Protection Ordinances.
- Compared the new DES Model Groundwater Protection Ordinance with the version that is currently being used in the Ossipee Aquifer Project. Prepared a two-page handout highlighting major differences in the two ordinances to share with the Ossipee Aquifer Steering Committee. Reviewed draft Model Groundwater Ordinance.
- Received a Source Water Protection Grant from the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services (NHDES) to continue working on Phase II efforts to protect the drinking water quality of the Ossipee Aquifer. This is a collaborative effort of several communities, The Green Mountain Conservation Group and the Planning Commission.
- Provided copies of the NH Planning and Land Use Regulation books to the town at considerable savings.
- Reviewed the town's proposed Groundwater Protection Ordinance in preparation for discussion by town officials.

MT. WASHINGTON VALLEY ECONOMIC COUNCIL

The Mt Washington Valley Economic Council is dedicated to helping area businesses grow and succeed. Ossipee is one of thirteen towns represented on the MWVEC. Businesses and individuals are encouraged to join to enjoy a number of benefits:

- The Revolving Loan Fund provides gap financing for business endeavors that otherwise might be unable to obtain financing. The Council has made 55 loans to area businesses totaling nearly \$1.6 million to date.
- Quality technology education and business skills training at the Learning Center where Granite State College, White Mountain Community College and Plymouth State University offer classes.
- Free and confidential business guidance and advice is available from seasoned experts who are part of SCORE (Service Corps of Retired Executives).
- Discounts on educational and informational forums.
- “Boot Camp Series” provide professional training for businesses and nonprofit organizations. Over 1200 people have participated.

The MWVEC is funded through a combination of grants, Revolving Loan Fund interest, membership dues, and corporate sponsorships which underwrite many of the educational programs and events.

In the past six years the startup high tech businesses in the Technology Village Incubator have created 43 new jobs which enhance the economy of the area.

OSSEEP CONSERVATION COMMISSION ANNUAL REPORT FOR 2010

The Ossipee Conservation Commission is responsible under RSA 36-A to assure the protection and proper utilization of Ossipee's natural resources. Members are appointed by the Selectboard. The Commission meets the second Wednesday of the month at 7 PM in the Ossipee Town Hall. All are welcome.

Re-elected in April as Chair and Vice Chair, respectively, were Elizabeth Gillette and Robert Pratt. Commissioners are Ralph Buchanan, Charlotte Fitzpatrick, Jean Hansen, Kevin Houle and Andy Northrop. Ron Adams serves as Alternate. Pat Jones is Secretary. We note Warren Walker's resignation from the Commission with both regret and great appreciation for his years of service. As Chair and Vice Chair Warren led the Commission with persuasion, intelligence and humor to set up the town's Lake Host Program at Pequawket Trail, raise \$250,000 to purchase the "Window on the Ossipee Mountains" conservation land on Route 16, and advise the town wisely on science-based natural resource planning.

The Commission worked throughout the year to safeguard Ossipee's natural resources. To monitor water quality the Commission partnered with the Green Mountain Conservation Group to sample water at 11 sites on rivers, lakes and streams from April to October. In the spring the Selectboard received from the Green Mountain Conservation Group (GMCG) an overview of Water Quality test results indicating that Ossipee rivers and streams are in good condition safe for further increased salinity of Frenchman's Brook due to accumulation of road salt. This information was put to use in September when the Commission recommended to the Planning Board that it require a closed waste-water system for a proposed car wash on Route 16, near Frenchman's Brook and over the aquifer, to prevent introduction of yet more salt into this important drinking water resource. The GMCG sponsored a Road-Salt Management Workshop in November to share with road agents and town officials best practices for de-icing. For more information click on water quality at: www.gmcg.org

Construction was completed in early summer on the "Window on the Ossipee Mountains" scenic pulloff. Designed by Ralph Buchanan to accommodate parking for automobiles and buses, the pulloff is already attracting passing motorists. We are grateful to many in the community for helping to conserve this land by donating funds, materials or services (in some cases all three!). Cutting to open the view went on all season and in late summer volunteers planted a Butterfly Garden in the old concrete foundation. A kiosk will be installed in 2011 to inform about the geologic history of the Ossipees, the Ossipee Watershed and aquifer, and how the open space is managed for view protection, wildlife habitat, and conservation of a notable wild orchid community. A nature trail is planned for 2011-2012 construction. The Dan Hole Pond Watershed Trust holds a conservation easement on the property. No funds raised from taxation were used either to purchase the property or to construct the overlook.

Growing infestations of invasive milfoil on Ossipee Lake drew concerted attention from Conservation Commissions and citizens in Ossipee, Freedom and Effingham. There appears no way to eradicate the plant but yearly management can mitigate its spread through hand-pulling, vacuum harvesting and/or chemical use at the decision of the Selectboard. The major contributor to milfoil growth is increased nutrients into the lake that feed invasive plants. Manmade or natural causes or both that boost nutrient levels include: Fertilizers on lawns and landscaping that run off into the lake with every rain, substandard septic systems, and high rainfall that may increase natural runoff into tributaries. On August 10 the Commission co-hosted with the Freedom Conservation Commission and the GMCG a presentation with NH Department of Environmental Services on "Ossipee Lake Monitoring Results," and also examined invasive milfoil control efforts. Increased salt and phosphorus in the bays point to the need to control road run-off with barriers. At the Ossipee Lake Natural Area, however, it was encouraging that E-coli test results were lower than in 2009, indicating that the new state recreation management plan there is working.

For the fifth year running the Commission supported the Lake Host Program (under the NH Lakes Association) to check boats entering and leaving Ossipee Lake for milfoil and other invasive plants which can easily spread by boat transport. Commissioners Jean Hansen and Warren Walker oversaw Lake Host Point Person Nick Paquette plus assistants at Pequawket Trail landing from June to September.

In other work Commissioners assisted with the successful Recreation Department-GMCG soil erosion prevention project at the Duncan Lake town beach by donating plants and hours of planting. The Commission kept apprised of work by the multi-town Aquifer Steering Committee on proposals to strengthen ordinances in Water Resources Protection Areas. Monitoring of conservation land included re-blazing property boundaries on the Depot Road lot in Tamworth that comprises part of the Sumner Brook Conservation project. In June Commissioners accompanied author and expert Paul Martin Brown on a walk to review wild orchids on the "Windows" property and discuss management alternatives for their protection; at the Commission meeting in August Brown spoke on wild orchids of the Northeast. In December Commissioners received from Ossipee resident James Airy a recreation management plan for the "Windows" property that he developed for University of New Hampshire course work.

The Commission reviewed 38 communications (down from 40 in 2009) to and from the Department of Environmental Services, such as individual applications to work in the shoreland protection zone or wetlands or other areas that would require a DES permit or monitoring. The Commission also noted 42 "Intents to Cut" (up from 33 in 2009) forwarded by the Selectmen. Commissioners made one site visit to review possible taking of fee title of properties in Ossipee for conservation purposes. We also walked the "Windows" property with a director of the Dan Hole

Pond Watershed Trust as required under terms of the conservation easement.

Volunteers are welcome to help protect the land and water resources of Ossipee, from serving as a Commissioner to water quality sampling or pitching in on a project. Active representation for Ossipee is also needed on the Green Mountain Conservation Group which provides a forum for Selectboards, Planning Boards, Conservation Commissions and citizens of Effingham, Freedom, Madison, Sandwich, Tamworth AND Ossipee to safeguard the natural resources of the Ossipee Watershed. This multi-town collaborative is crucial as our town boundaries criss-cross the vast 374-square-mile Watershed and underlying aquifer, and any action by one town can affect the interests of all.

2010 Annual Report

To The Selectmen and the Citizens of the Town of Ossipee:

The biggest change in the Department this year was the departure of Assistant Director, Jason Hanken. We wish Jason well and thank him for the impact he had on the youth, teens, and families here during his 4 years as our Assistant.

The Department's goal is to offer a wide range of activities for all ages designed to meet the needs of the community, and to encourage healthy use of your leisure time. To that end, in 2010, the Department offered 28 activities for children & youth, 15 for teens, 18 for adults and 23 special events. There are activities for all age groups. I am always searching for new programs to add. If you have an idea for a new activity, please contact me so we can discuss it and possibly include it in the schedule. I also continue to search for alternative funding sources for programs and projects. The summer teen program was partially funded through a Grant from the State of NH Incentive Fund Grant Program and I plan to apply for the same Grant in 2011. Other grants were awarded to complete renovation projects at town recreation facilities. These grants are monitored and administered by the Department.

Maintaining the grass and general clean up of Constitution Park, YMCA Field, Mill Pond Park, Main Street Park grass, and Town Hall grass is the responsibility of the Department. In addition to this, the Department also oversees improvements and renovations to the recreation facilities in town. In 2010, the Town Beach on Duncan Lake underwent major renovations to control rain water runoff and to improve safety. Constitution Park saw renovations to the elevated walkway on the hiking trails, upgrades to the electrical system, and a new infield on the baseball field. A number of other projects are planned for 2011.

Communication of the Department's activities is made through several sources. These include: weekly updates in the local papers, announcements on Cable Channel 3, daily announcements at the schools, publication of a Quarterly Program Brochure, and updates on our FaceBook page and website all keep you up-to-date on what is happening with the Department. To the Selectmen and Citizens of the Town of Ossipee, Ossipee Concerned Citizens, Inc. submits its Annual Report for the year 2010:

Ossipee Concerned Citizens, Inc. is a non-profit multi-human services agency dedicated to the promotion of growth and prosperity for all citizens of the Town of Ossipee and vicinity. Current programming includes the Elderly Nutrition Program (Meals-On-Wheels and congregate meals), the WIC (Women, Infants, and Children nutrition/education) Program, and the Ossipee Crossings Child Care Center. Further, the Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP) is funded by the United States Department of Agriculture, and provides non-perishable foods to eligible WIC participants, and seniors who are sixty (60) years and older. In addition, the Ossipee Senior Center is certified by the New Hampshire Association of Senior Centers.

The WIC Program has provided food vouchers, and nutrition and breastfeeding counseling to eligible families since 1980. There is presently a 700 client caseload. Certification and voucher clinics are held in Center Ossipee and five other sites in Carroll County.

The child care center continues to provide working families with day care at Ossipee Crossings. An experienced staff of teachers are on duty to provide safe, educational, and enjoyable care for children from three to twelve years of age. The center is a licensed Early Childhood Education facility.

The senior center offers a variety of senior activities which promote physical and emotional health, and opportunities to address wellness in a no-cost environment. Those activities are organized by OCC staff, and in conjunction with other organizations and individuals.

Fundraisers are integral to the economic success of OCC, and ultimately to its provision of services. Staff and volunteers, OCC Board of Directors included, have remained active to that end.

OCC has several funding sources, and include the Bureau of Elderly and Adult Services, Bureau of Child Development, USDA, Lakes Region United Way, and the Ossipee Children's Fund. The annual budget approaches nine-hundred thousand (\$900,000) dollars. However, of that total, only sixty-seven percent (67%) is a combination of state and federal dollars. The balance (33 percent) must be collected through fundraising, donations, and town support.

The 2010 Santa Project assisted one-hundred fifty-eight families at Christmas time. This annual project is perhaps the greatest symbol of organizations and individuals who, with a common and meaningful goal, achieve greatness in

partnership.

Space does not permit all those who we would like to thank individually. There are so many, and they are indispensable. We acknowledge in this report the generosity of volunteers and staff, the OCC Board of Directors, town employees, and the support of the citizens of the Town of Ossipee. Much has been done by collaboration.

VNA-HOSPICE ANNUAL REPORT 2010

VNA-Hospice of Southern Carroll County and Vicinity is in its 8th decade of providing home health, hospice and community health and family support services to the residents in the Lakes Region. Our employees and volunteers work as a team to provide quality home based health care to residents of Ossipee, and ten other towns in the Lakes Region. We are a not-for-profit Agency, governed by local residents and licensed by the State of New Hampshire and supported by the community. Our Home Health and our Hospice Care Programs are Medicare/Medicaid Certified. Our Maternal Child Health Program and Community Health programs provide prevention and family support and assist in ensuring the public health of our residents.

We were privileged to provide the residents of Ossipee with services from all three of our programs during the last year. The Agency's staff made 23,430 home visits during FY 2010. Of those 4,066 were made to Ossipee residents representing 17.4% of agency visits. This included home care, hospice care and maternal child health home visits. We also provided immunization clinics, school based oral health services and health screening clinics to Ossipee citizens.

We have struggled with the implications of a shaky economy; the reality of home health cuts to the Medicare and Medicaid system and the enactment of health care reform. Our quality of care and scope of services have not diminished. Our patient satisfaction remains stellar. We have remained true to our mission and have served all ages, the insured and the uninsured.

We are pleased to announce that in October our agency merged with Community Health and Hospice of Laconia. Our new organization will be named Central NH VNA and Hospice. We continue to do business as VNA-Hospice of Southern Carroll County & Vicinity. This effort will help us to streamline administrative expenses, continue on with our mission and give us the ability to continue to provide quality home health care services to the residents of Ossipee and the other communities we serve.

Thank you for your continued support and for allowing us to provide Ossipee residents with needed home health care and community support services.

OSSIPEE WATER AND SEWER COMMISSION

The Ossipee Water and Sewer Commission, has continued to make upgrades to both the water and sewer system in Center Ossipee.

"Camp David"

Two leach beds were reconstructed this year along brush cutting and additional clearing. The facility received approximately 500,000 gallons of septage and processed more than 32 million gallons of wastewater. Monitoring wells showed all groundwater to be within State and EPA limits. Next year the replacement of several more leach beds is planned.

Water System

The Center Ossipee Water system is in very good condition. All our water tests have come back with excellent test ratings speaking highly of the quality of work and maintenance accomplished by our highly trained staff.

The hydrants were painted in the spring and repairs were made to several hydrants as a result of being struck by vehicles. The hydrants at "Longlook" and 88 Moultonville Road were replaced. Several service shutoffs were replaced and five breaks were repaired.

Sewer System

Work continued on the evaluation of the sewer system to determine why flows increase dramatically during storm events. Several manholes were sealed to help prevent infiltration. Residents are also reminded that it is illegal to connect gutters, down spouts and sump pumps to the sanitary sewer system. These devices should connect to storm drains or daylight away from the structure.

At this point we wish to extend our sincere appreciation to the various Town Departments for their continued help and support throughout the year. The Board of Selectmen, and Mrs. Martha Eldridge, Town Administrator, for their help in keeping things moving smoothly. Mrs. Kellie Skehan and her Tax Office Staff, Ms. Trish Hodge and Mrs. Tracy Cragin for all their hard work collecting revenue for the Department and last but not least, the Town Office Staff, and Ms. Natalie Hall, Treasurer.

We especially wish to thank the Public Works/Highway Department without whose help the Ossipee Water and Sewer Department would be hard pressed, and for their old dump truck which has enabled us to accomplish additional work without disrupting their operations.

OSSIPEE TRANSFER & RECYCLING FACILITY ANNUAL REPORT FOR 2010

2010 was a busy year at the Transfer Station with 30,994 vehicles passing through and was also our first full year of operating with our new compactors and baler. It has proven to be a much more economical way to process the household solid waste as we were able to operate with a \$23,000.00 reduction in our budget this past year. We were also able to start building the shed over the recycling bins to keep the weather out which will allow the Town to receive top dollar for the recycled goods.

The recycling effort has continued to have a positive impact on our town and the environment. This past year the Transfer Station was able to sell over 315 tons of recycled material. The cost savings alone by not having to pay the tipping fees of \$48.00/ton equals out to \$15,120.00. The total income generated in 2010 from the sale of the recyclables and fees is \$111,743.18, which is up approximately \$9,750.00 over 2009.

Our goal at the Transfer Station is to increase the amount of recycled materials each year, which in turn will help reduce taxes for the town and reduce the amount of waste going into the landfills.

I would like to thank Ron Davis and his crew at the Transfer Station for doing an outstanding job this past year.

The employees at the Transfer & Recycling Facility would like to send a big "Thank You" to all of the residents for a job well done!

OSSIPEE HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT ANNUAL REPORT FOR 2010

The 2010 season was a very busy one for the Highway Department. The crew spent many long days and nights during the winter doing an outstanding job keeping the roads clear and safe for the community.

The Highway Department was again very active in making improvements in the drainage system by replacing culverts and cleaning ditches in Granite, Ossipee Mountain Area, Water Village and the Bays.

Along with the many hours spent grading and rolling all of the dirt roads, the Highway Department also added much needed new gravel to Sawyer Road, Leavitt Road, Bay Point Road, Channel Road, Ridge Road and Pequawket Trail Road.

A major reconstruction of Sawyer Road continued on the Route 171 end which included the installation of base pavement on Glidden Hill. The paving projects this year included the shimming and overlaying on Dorrs Corner Road, Valley Road, Annie Nichols Road and Granite Road.

The design for the new bridge deck for the Chapel Road Bridge was completed, but due to how late in the season it was the actual replacement will occur in the early summer of 2011.

The Highway Department was instrumental along with Stanley Eldridge and Mark Wright in removing and installing the dam gate at Big Dan Hole Pond. The new gate is working better than we could imagine in regulating the flow thru the dam.

The crew at the Highway Department takes great pride in improving and maintaining the roads in the Town of Ossipee and would like to thank all of the people for their support.

CENTER OSSIPEE FIRE & RESCUE DEPARTMENT

In the year 2010, the Center Ossipee Fire & Rescue Department answered 295 emergency calls. The calls were broken down as follows:

Motor vehicle accidents – 35; Mutual Aid Requests – 15; Structure Fires – 15; Service Calls – 11; Alarm Activations – 28; Forestry Calls – 15; Hazardous Material Calls – 6; Automobile Fires – 3; Technical Rescues – 3; Emergency Medical Calls – 164 total, broken down as follows: General illness – 24; Seizures – 13; Cardiac Arrest – 4; Bleeding Emergencies – 11; Overdose – 2; Chest Pain – 14; Fall Victims – 10; Lift Assist – 17; Medical Alarms – 8; Unconscious Person – 6; Difficulty Breathing – 17; Welfare Checks – 1; Strokes – 4; Allergic Reactions – 4; Burns – 1; Assaults – 4; Diabetic – 7; Trauma Injuries – 7; Broken Bones – 5; Other Type Injuries – 5.

The Fire & Rescue Department spent 8,054 hours attending firefighter training, medical training and answering emergency calls in 2010. The Fire Department Inspection Division spent 2,054 hours completing the following inspections during 2010: oil burner inspections – 8; assembly inspections – 76; plan reviews – 10; foster care inspections – 4; and, new home occupancy inspections – 2.

The fire chiefs and duty crew spent 2,969 hours completing: Fire Prevention programs; department administration; grant program management; fire department business meetings and trainings; emergency calls; Ossipee Valley Mutual Aid and Emergency Medical Services meetings; department work details; emergency vehicle maintenance and repairs; fire truck pump test; NFPA1901 annual aerial certification; annual air pack certification; annual cascade system service; annual NFPA 1851 firefighter gear testing; general inspection follow up; follow up on necessary repairs and maintenance; Knox Box systems and associated installations; weekly truck inspection and repairs; pre-planning for emergency responses; and, rebuilding of fire pumps on 1E3 and 1E5 to stay in compliance with NFPA 1901.

The Fire Department continued to update equipment in 2010 by purchasing the following items: a new MSA Thermal Imager; new Hurst quick twist lock connectors for the extrication tools; six sets of Quaker firefighter turnout gear; six sets of Globe firefighter boots; a MSA gas meter; and, a Darley NFPA approved hose tester.

Center Ossipee Fire and Rescue Department's membership in 2010 consisted of twenty firefighters and one chaplain.

The department members' certifications consist of the following: 13 certified Level One firefighters; 2 Level Two certified firefighters; 2 Career Level certified

firefighters; 13 firefighters certified in hazardous material operations; 1 certified hazardous material technician; 4 certified firefighters at Inspector One level; 2 firefighters certified in Confined Space Rescue Work; 8 certified ladder company operators; 4 firefighters certified as Rapid Intervention Rescue; 5 First Responders; 6 firefighters certified at EMT-Basic level; 2 firefighters certified at EMT- I level; 1 certified at Paramedic level; 1 certified EMT practical exam evaluator; 2 certified in Emergency Response to Terrorist Incidents and Terrorist Bombings; 17 certified in dealing with mass casualty Incidents; 17 certified in Firefighter Rehabilitation procedures; 20 firefighters certified at IS-00700; 20 certified ICS/Nims; 20 certified CPR-AED; 1 certified Rescue Systems One; 1 firefighter certified as a Swift Water Technician; and, 7 firefighters licensed at the Commercial Drivers License status.

The members of the Center Ossipee Fire and Rescue Department are dedicated to providing the highest level of life safety and preservation of property. This mission shall be accomplished with the utmost respect for those we serve with the commitment to strive for the highest achievement goals. We plan and prepare with the future needs of our community in mind. We also continue to encourage the public to be a positive part of the team that works hard for the precinct. We continue to apply for federal grants in an attempt to off-set precinct taxes for those we serve. As Chief, once again I would like to thank the command staff and the dedicated hardworking department members for always going beyond the call of duty for their community. In addition, I wish to recognize and thank the Precinct Fire Commissioners' office for their hard work throughout the year. And on behalf of myself and the entire department, thank you to the precinct members for your continued support of the Center Ossipee Fire & Rescue Department.

FOREST FIRE WARDEN'S ANNUAL REPORT – 2010

There were approximately 721 permits to burn issued throughout the Town for 2010. There were over 30 wildland responses in town this year. All were fortunately relatively small in size. Causes of the fires ranged from: no permits, illegal materials, careless disposal of cigarettes or ashes, lightning, or downed power lines.

The Department lost one of its Deputy Wardens' this year, Roland "Harry" Libby. Harry was not only a Deputy Warden for the Town, but he was also a Special Deputy for the State and was the Watchman for Green Mountain Fire Tower. He took exceptional care of the tower and was an excellent watchman. When Harry called in a fire he could not only put the responding fire department in the area, but most times in the yard of where the fire was located. Roland was also a member of the Ossipee Corner Fire Department for thirty years before retiring as Assistant Chief.

Law Brochures are available at the Town Hall. Further information on the laws can be found through the Department of Resources and Economic Development, Division of Forest and Lands at www.nhdf.l.org. Please remember that if the ground is not completely covered with snow at least within a 100 foot radius around any brush pile to be burned, then a fire permit is needed. When in question call and ask. If you wish to burn without snow cover, please call the Fire Department in your Precinct. The Department numbers are listed below. Please only leave a message at one Department. These calls are returned by call fire/rescue personnel that are answering emergency calls on a daily basis, so it is recommended to call at least one day before the day that you wish to burn so there is adequate time for your call to be returned and for someone to issue the permit.

WEST OSSIPPEE FIRE DEPARTMENT ANNUAL REPORT 2010

West Ossipee Fire Chief Bradley Eldridge

This year has been a busy one for West Ossipee Fire Department. In addition to the 226 emergency calls we responded to this year, we have been steadily working on several projects and acquiring and putting into service new equipment that voters approved at our January 2010 precinct meeting.

At that meeting, voters agreed to enter into an equipment lease that allowed us to purchase much needed equipment. An inspection of all turnout gear revealed many pieces needed repair and 15 sets had to be destroyed as they no longer provided adequate protection for our members. Our stock of air packs ranged from 6-16 years old and no longer met current standards. We were able to replace the gear, purchase all new air packs, upgrade our Jaws of Life, purchase turnout gear for our Explorers, and purchase a new stair chair that allows us to better assist patients without risk of injury to the firefighter or patient.

Work continued at the new Jewell Hill Fire Station with shelving being installed, septic system installed, bathroom construction, electrical upgrade to allow generator to be put in service should the building be needed as an emergency shelter and the new sign installed. Additionally, the grounds have been improved with donated irrigation and hydroseeding. We anticipate installing a new flag pole at both stations in 2011.

Several improvements were made at our Central Station as well. Landscaping work was done, the old oil tank and furnace were removed, the septic system was cleaned and repaired, and construction of the new bathroom is in progress. As cold weather set in, we were especially grateful that voters approved a new furnace which is operating much cleaner and more efficiently than our old one.

Our members logged a combined 1,199 hours responding to emergency calls this year. It was also a very active year for training as our members logged 894 hours of training. We were able to send three members to the National Fire Academy and three members to Rapid Intervention Training (RIT). Additionally, our EMS members train monthly through Ossipee Valley Mutual Aid Association programs and Brocktalk – a joint training with Freedom Fire/EMS.

Again this year we are very proud to be able to offer the Explorer program. Nine teens are currently part of this program and are learning the basics of firefighting alongside our senior members. We have instituted a new monthly training schedule that offers practice to our senior members and teaches a wide variety of skills to our Explorers including use of SCBA, live fire training, ropes and knots and proper donning of protective equipment.

Due to the skilled membership that we are proud to have, we have been able to increase the in-house routine maintenance on vehicles and small equipment, thus realizing cost savings.

It is important to recognize the confidence and continued support we receive from local, state and federal agencies, Carroll County Sheriff's Department, West Ossipee residents and voters and, especially, the families of our members. We look forward to continuing our service to the community in 2011.



REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

In December of 2009, the District held its groundbreaking ceremony for Phase I of the Kingswood complex project. On November 30, 2010, North Branch Construction, Inc. completed the Kingswood Arts Center and the new building was officially opened on December 16, 2010. To accommodate Phase II work at the Middle School, the Arts Center is being temporarily used for the remainder of the 2010 - 2011 school year as instructional classroom space. All middle school pupils are expected to return to their newly renovated building in September of 2011. The additions and renovation to Kingswood Regional High School and the Region 9 Career and Technical Center are all under way and should be completed by the end of the summer in 2012. When completed, all three secondary schools located on the Kingswood campus will be heated and cooled by the geothermal well system.

As of the writing of this report, the State of New Hampshire has not lifted its ban on providing building aid for new school projects. The timing of the Kingswood project and the wisdom of the voters in supporting it have preserved millions of dollars in aid money for Governor Wentworth.

Taxpayers were pleasantly surprised when they received their 2010 property tax bills. Unexpected revenues as well as reduced and deferred spending helped the District significantly lower the local property tax assessment during the difficult economic times of 2010. Unexpected federal monies received by the District were used instead of local funds and a delay in borrowing for the Kingswood project reduced fiscal year interest payments saving the taxpayers several hundred thousand dollars of interest expense. Additionally, we did not use Build America Bonds to finance the project and \$200,000 of raised and appropriated interest expense was returned to taxpayers. All of these factors contributed to a significant drop in each town's local property tax assessment for schools. While that is certainly good news for taxpayers, it does create a perception problem for 2011. It is unlikely that any of the aforementioned circumstances will occur this coming year and like an optical illusion, it will appear that 2011 property tax assessments are taking an unusually high jump. However, when compared to 2009, the average annual increase over the past two years is only about 3.35%. Given the increase in health insurance premium rates and the significant shift of New Hampshire Retirement System contributions from the state to local communities as well as the new debt service, the average assessment increase is very responsible.

Last year, the Teachers' Association voted to extend their contract for one year without a change in wage scale. While some teachers will receive step increases, those at the top of the scale will not receive any increase. Administrators also extended their contract for one year without any pay increases. Additionally, every administrator gave back one week of pay to the District to help keep expenses down for local taxpayers. I am not aware of any other public employee groups in New Hampshire that voluntarily made similar offers to help the local economy. Consequently, I am very appreciative and proud of these two groups of employees and their willingness to make a personal sacrifice for the greater good of the community.
